Situation Update

Over 60 years of civil war have left Burma one of the poorest countries in the world. During this time, successive military dictatorships killed thousands of their own people and displaced millions in resistance areas. Recent developments have created some positive changes while there is still ongoing oppression.

Good News:

1. Ceasefire negotiations ongoing with many ethnic groups and an overall reduction in fighting.
2. Hundreds of political prisoners released.
3. Some positive reforms.

Ongoing oppression:

1. Attacks continue in many ethnic areas.
2. There are still hundreds of political prisoners.
3. Major outbreaks of communal violence.
4. Humanitarian access blocked in many areas.

F B R R E S P O N S E

In a year, FBR conducts over 120 relief missions in 12 ethnic areas:

- People, horses, mules, trucks and boats carry thousands of loads of relief supplies to people in need.
- Medicine is distributed to treat over 80,000 patients who have little access to medical care.
- Clothing, tarps, blankets, food, soap, and other needed relief supplies are distributed for over 50,000 people.
- Five major leadership, relief team, and medical trainings are conducted for new and old teams.
- FBR’s Jungle School of Medicine provides advanced training and medical services.

Working with others, over 70 Free Burma Ranger humanitarian relief teams bring help to people in the conflict zones of Burma. Since 1997, over 900 missions have been conducted to assist over 1,100,000 people.
